## The Cross and Crown

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One of the most important things to keep in mind when we read the Bible is context. An improper understanding of the context of the passages we read makes us vulnerable to grave error.

There are two kinds of context to consider. First, we must be aware of the historical context, keeping in mind the audience for whom the passage was originally written. The internet has a wealth of resources to help with that. However, while it's important to understand the original intent, we must also remember that God's Word is eternal—living and active—and is just as valid for us today as it was at the time then, for the original audience. Although some Scripture passages might make us uncomfortable, we can't simply write them off because they were written in a different time and culture.



The second and most important consideration is the biblical context. The Bible is internally consistent: *Every* Scripture is in agreement with *all* of Scripture. Although the Bible was written over the course of centuries. by multiple human authors, the Spirit who inspired those authors ensures that they all line up together. We can be tricked into grossly errant doctrine if we ignore biblical context. Imagine having ten pieces of a 5,000 piece puzzle. Those few pieces may fit together and form a clear image, but the other 4,990 pieces, we can come up with an image that

bears almost no resemblance to the original. In order to understand Scripture in context, we need to be familiar with all the Bible – reading it regularly and in its entirety – and we need to meditate on the passages we read, giving the Holy Spirit time to make them clear to us.

The ultimate context of Scripture is to point people towards God. When we read, we should expect to hear from God, words of "teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" that align us with his will and that inspire and empower us to share the cleansing, healing Word with those around us.
