Lately, I've been obsessed with the parable of the good Samaritan. I think the vast profundity of this parable is somewhat lost on us, in part, because we're not familiar with the characters. Jesus chose characters who would be familiar with his audience, but they're a bit foreign to our American Christian frame of reference. So, let's update them. Instead of a priest, a Levite and a Samaritan, let's consider a pastor, a deacon and an atheist. A man is lying helpless in a ditch, having been set upon by robbers, and a pastor passes by careful to keep his distance. A deacon sees the man and also passes by at a distance. Finally, an atheist who comes on the scene stops and takes care of the man's wounds, pledging to pay the medical expenses out of his own pocket.

The amazing part of the parable is that Jesus deliberately made the atheist the hero, declaring that we should behave like the atheist and not like the church leaders!

Do you remember why Jesus told this parable? Luke wrote that a teacher of the Law asked who his neighbor was, wanting to justify himself in the face of the command, "Love your neighbor as yourself." In other words, he wanted Jesus to draw limits around the people he was required to love. The parable of the Good Samaritan was Jesus' rebuke of the kind of love that is only for a limited set of people and only given out of obligation to a commandment.



The priest and the Levite would have justified their decision to pass by the injured man on the other side: They couldn't afford to make themselves unclean, because they had to be about God's work. They may have claimed to love the injured man, and, perhaps, they really did – but remember Jesus' question: Which of them was a neighbor to him? To put it another way, which of them showed that man the kind of love that they had for themselves?

Other than loving God, there's no greater commandment than loving our neighbor as ourselves. If we're not following the Samaritan's example, does anything else that we do really matter?

Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.

(I John 3:17)

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

Highway has gone by at least 5 names in its history: The Cross and Crown Association (Gospel Wagon), Union Highway Gospel Mission (the mission, at 23rd and Jefferson), Union Highway Mission Tabernacle (the old schoolhouse, at Harvard and Oxford), Highway Mission Tabernacle Union Un-denominational Church (as chartered in 1899), and Highway Mission Tabernacle (as renamed for the 90th anniversary, in 1984).
