

These days, the GPS navigation systems in cars can look ahead, to see congestion, accidents or detours on the way to a destination, and adjust the route to compensate for those occurrences. What they can't do, though, is compel the driver to follow the course that they map out. If a driver decides that to take a shortcut, the navigation system simply adjusts its route, trying to find the best way forward.

In the first two parts of our series on walking faithfully with God, we considered that walking together means agreeing to go to the same place and agreeing to go at the same pace. We'll conclude the series by considering the need to agree to go on the same path.

There are times when God doesn't lead down the most direct path. Sometimes, he chooses a longer but less dangerous path, as in Exodus, when God took Israel the long way to avoid war with the Philistines (Exodus 13:17,18). Sometimes, he takes us down a longer path as a way to strengthen and equip us, as when God promised to drive out the nations little by little, lest the wild animals overwhelm them (Deuteronomy 7:22).

When God lays out a course, we can choose to deviate from it, but at our own peril. Consider David, who waited seven years to take the throne after God had him anointed king. Twice during that period, he had an opportunity to kill King Saul, but he refused, committing himself to God's path instead. Jacob, by contrast, having been promised that he would rule over his brother, took matters into his own hands, swindled Esau out of his birthright, and, later, cheated him out of his blessing. As a result of these "shortcuts," Jacob spent 20 years in hard labor (as he described it to his father-in-law), far from his home and his inheritance.

God doesn't abandon us when we deviate from his path, but it's always best to go his way. Walking faithfully requires walking in faith, trusting in where and how he's leading.

In all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight. (Proverbs 3:6)
