"No Cross, No Crown"

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"Brothers and sisters, pray for us." I Thessalonians 5:25

David's kingship was sandwiched between the reigns of Saul and Solomon, two kings who, like David, were specifically chosen as king by God and whose reigns ended poorly.

All three kings began their reigns in humility. The difference between David and the other two is that David remained humble to the end, "a man after God's own heart." (I Samuel 13:14)



One of the greatest challenges that we face as Christians is that of remaining humble. Pride isn't something that only the rich and powerful need to be wary of. Our enemy, the Devil, attacks the humility even of those without wealth and power by playing to their ego, telling them that they deserve more. This goes all the way back to the Garden of Eden, when he convinced Adam and Eve that they could be like God and that God was selling them short in forbidding them to eat from the tree.

David was far from perfect. The Bible doesn't cover up the big sins that he committed. What set him apart from Saul and Solomon was that, ultimately, after every transgression, he acknowledged that God was right and repented of his sin. Contrast that with Saul, who placed his own will and judgment above God's command, and with Solomon, who, as a result of trying to consolidate power, ended up following many foreign gods.

Pride can show up in many different ways, so we must constantly examine our hearts. Let King David's prayer be our example: "Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." (Psalm 139:23,25)

Has not my hand made all these things, and so they came into being?" declares the Lord. "These are the ones I look on with favor: those who are humble and contrite in spirit, and who tremble at my word. (Isaiah 66:2)

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
